Smith hopes to leverage his extensive knowledge of mathematics to help his students develop the skills necessary for critical thinking and problem-solving.

"We develop a sense of perseverance and respect to create a culture of openness and persistence in learning, understanding that we all can grow in our learning," Smith said of his classroom. "We accept multiple perspectives presented in and out of the classroom and take on challenges wholeheartedly, knowing that we can learn from the experience whatever the outcome. From this, we learn how to think critically and use that critical thinking to solve problems effectively, pulling out important information and determining the strategies that are most effective in determining a solution."

ATC addresses teacher shortages in high-need districts based on geographic regions and specific critical content areas designated by the Arkansas Department of Education. ATC's mission is to "recruit, train and support exceptional, social justiceoriented individuals to serve as teachers for Arkansas students who need them the

To become an Arkansas Teacher Corps Fellow, applicants are required to have a bachelor's degree in any major, a record of academic success, and a communityfocused mindset emphasizing leadership and service learning. ATC Fellows attend a rigorous seven-week residential summer training, which includes over 150 hours of professional development and clinical practice as a summer school teacher in the Osceola School Dis-

Individuals selected as ATC Fellows commit to teaching for three years in a high-need school district, must pass all required educator licensure tests and participate in ongoing professional development and coaching throughout their Fellowship. Upon successful completion of the program, ATC Fellows receive their standard fiveyear teaching license.

Along with Smith, six other ATC Fellows teach in the Blytheville school district. At Blytheville High School,

ATC is a partnership between the University of Arkansas, the Arkansas Department of Education, and 23 Arkansas school districts. Funding for the program has available made through collaboration between the College of Education and Health Professions, the Walton Family Foundation, the Arkansas Department of Education, the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation, and individual donors through the Arkansas Teacher Corps Society.

Badger Jr. High Cover Design Winners




